Getting to Know: Karen Funk



Karen Funk attended Coppell High School as a freshman but moved to Irving and graduated from Nimitz in 1975. The transition from a class B school to a 5A was quite a change. She played volleyball, basketball and ran track at Coppell then played the only sport offered at Nimitz-volleyball for the next three years. After graduation, Karen attended the University of Texas at Arlington and graduated in December of 1979. She earned her Master's Degree and Mid-Management Degree from Texas A&M in Kingsville in 1996.

Karen began coaching in January of 1980 at Lee Middle School in Grand Prairie and coached the volleyball, basketball and track teams for two years. She moved to Highlands High School in San Antonio in 1981 and became head volleyball coach. During her five years at Highlands, her teams won two district championships and advanced to the regional finals one year and regional quarterfinals the next year.

Her next stop was Madison High School in San Antonio as the head volleyball coach. Making that move in 1986, Karen stayed for 14 years where she lead her team to the playoffs seven times including the semifinals of the state tournament in 1988 and regional finals in 1989. Karen was named as San Antonio Express-News Coach of the Year in 1988. During her tenure at Madison, she served as the Vice-Chairman and Chairman for the Texas Girls Coaches Association volleyball committee, and as the TGCA Region 7 Director from 1991-1995.

After 22 years of coaching, Karen moved to the NEISD athletic office in 2000 as an Assistant Athletic Director and in 2011 became the Director of Girl's Sports. Since joining the staff at Blossom Athletic Center, she has earned her Certified Athletic Administrator certificate, co-hosted the NIAAA national convention once and worked as the hospitality chairman in 2012. Karen has been a member of the hosting state conference committee twice and worked for THSADA as the secretary from Spring of 2006-2010. She then served as the Region 8 Director, and vice-president. In 2012 Karen became the organization's president, and will serve next year as the past president.

Karen has been married to Brian Funk for 6 years and inherited a beautiful family with the ceremony. Three great boys came with the "I Do's", Garret-26 a physician's assistant, Taylor-24 a chef in San Diego and Zachary17 soon to be a graduating senior.

Bob Dubey has dedicated his professional career of 36 years to the Richardson School District. He graduated from Richardson High School and later attended Southern Arkansas University on a football scholarship. He began his teaching and coaching career at West Junior High and later moved to Richardson High where he was the defensive coordinator and head baseball coach. Bob eventually became the Area Coordinator and Head Football Coach at Berkner High School. After 23 years serving the district at various teaching and coaching positions, Bob became the RISD Director of Athletics, a position he has served for the past 13 years. Over the course of his career Bob has earned many honors such as RISD Health Teacher of the Year, University of Texas "Texas Excellence Award" for outstanding high school teachers, District 9-5A Coach of the Year, Metroplex Coach of the Year, and NFL/Dallas Cowboys Coach of the Week.
